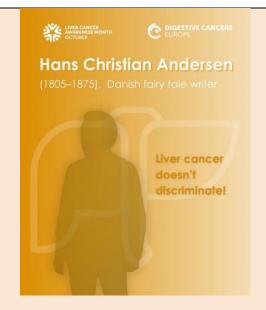
Did you know that famous storyteller Hans Christian Andersen died in 1875 from liver cancer?

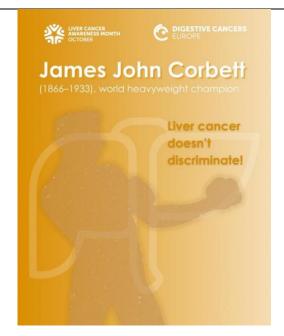
James J. Corbett, known as the "Father of Modern Boxing," died of liver cancer in 1933, at the age of 66.

His loss is a reminder to all of us that liver cancer knows no boundaries and can touch anyone, even world-class athletes.

Because liver cancer often causes few or no symptoms until it is advanced, those at higher risk cannot afford to wait.

Simple tools, such as ultrasound scans and blood tests, can catch problems early, when treatment is more effective and outcomes are far better.

Speak with your doctor if you are experiencing symptoms such as unexplained weight loss, persistent fatigue, abdominal swelling or pain, jaundice (yellowing of the skin or eyes), or if you think you might be at risk due to conditions like hepatitis B or C, heavy alcohol use, or non-alcoholic fatty liver disease.

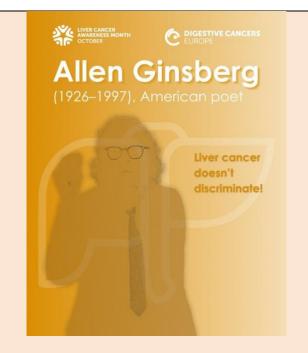

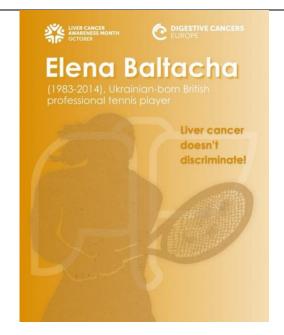

Elena Baltacha, Britain's former top tennis player, passed away from liver cancer at just 30. Her story serves as a reminder that this disease doesn't discriminate based on athletic ability or gender.

Although men face nearly twice the risk of liver cancer compared to women, with a lifetime risk of 1 in 91 for men versus 1 in 333 for women, liver cancer remains a leading cause of cancer deaths in Europe for all.
