

It often develops slowly, and its early signs are easy to overlook. Persistent heartburn, bloating after meals, stomach discomfort, nausea, or frequent burping may seem minor, but if these symptoms continue or worsen, it's important to consult a doctor.




Did you know that Franz Xaver, the youngest son of the renowned Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, died of gastric cancer in 1844? His passing shows how this illness doesn't look at fame or legacy.

However, there are different small but effective daily choices you can make to lower your risk of gastric cancer. For example, reducing salt and limiting smoked or heavily processed foods helps protect the stomach lining.


Gastric cancer can progress rapidly, which is why everyone should be aware of the risk factors and take action early.




Edith Tudor-Hart, an Austrian British photographer, died of gastric cancer in 1973. Her story serves as a reminder that this disease does not discriminate based on gender or artistic abilities.

While men have a higher lifetime risk, about 1 in 91, women are also affected, with around 1 in 200 facing the disease. So, gastric cancer impacts both genders, and no one is immune.

Detecting the disease early can improve your chances of treatment and survival. So, you can reduce your risk of gastric cancer by learning more about how to prevent it:
